Voting for Community Education Councils

Community Education Councils (CECs)



9 parents

- 1 parent of an English Language Learner
- 1 parent of a Special Education student

2 appointees

All councils have a non-voting member who is a high school senior

Community Education Councils:

- ✓ Host town halls with the Chancellor.
- ✓ Advise on education policies and improvements to school buildings.
- ✓ Collaborate with the superintendent to improve student achievement.
- ✓ Decide on zoning lines and consult on school co-locations.

Voting for Citywide Education Councils

The 4 Citywide Education Councils advocate for specific populations: high school students, English language learners, and students with disabilities.

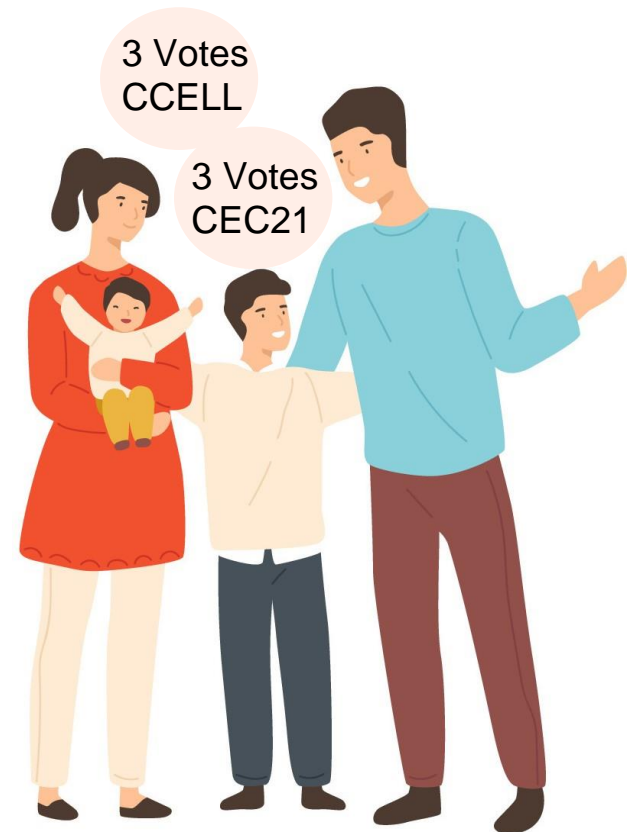
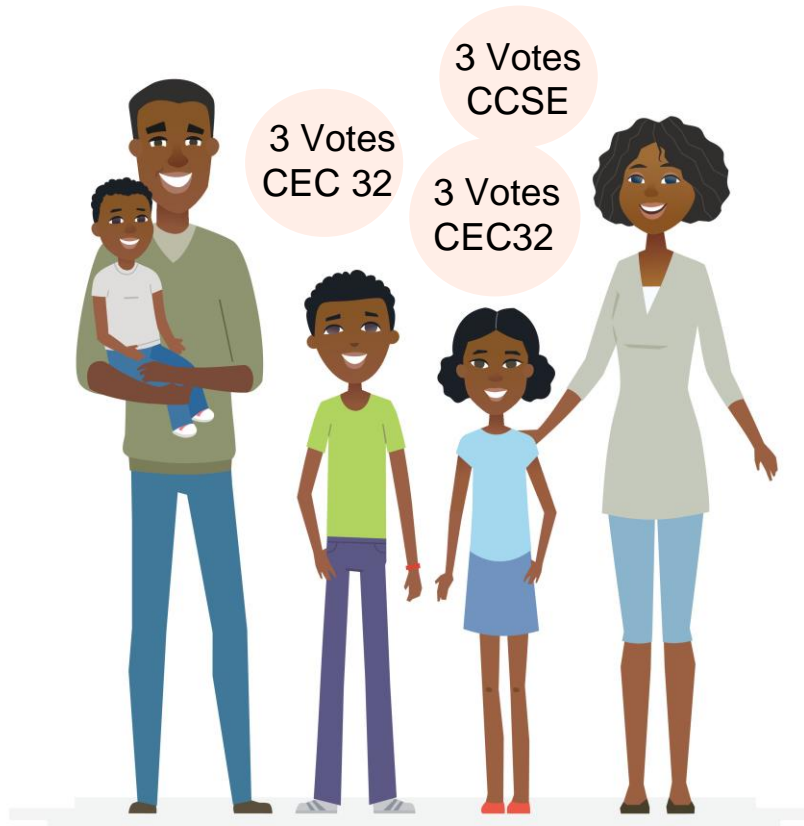

This family has a child in a D21 school. He is also an English Language Learner.

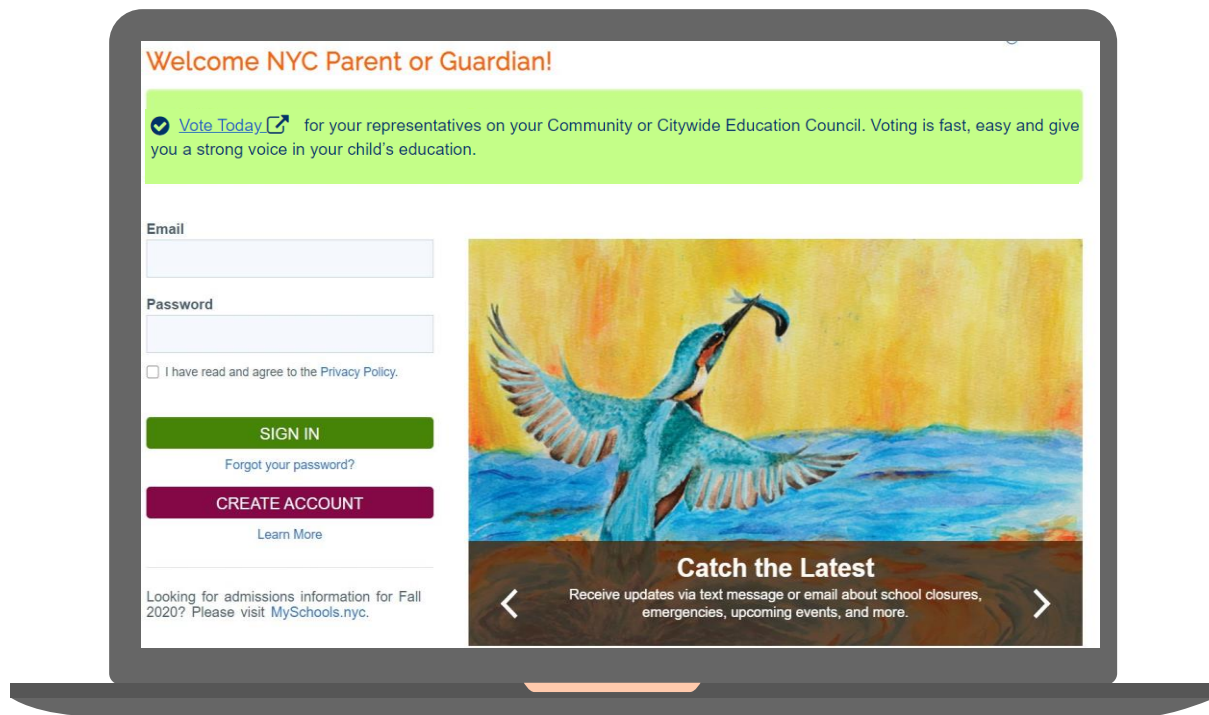
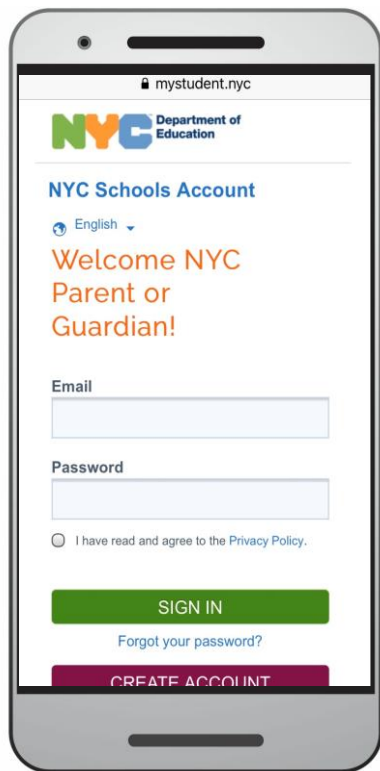


This family has 2 children in a D32 school. One child has an IEP.

Voting opens on May 1 and ends on May 11






